

Thanks for your comments guys. Today I was pleased to see my first Holly Blue of the year as I was driving out the Close heading to Frog Firle. I was hoping to find a Wall pupa but once again I wasn't lucky. Eventually I did find a near fully grown larva. Before this I met briefly Downland Boy who found the wing of a female Emperor Moth. The moth had presumably been eaten by a bird. Several Brimstone, Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock and Red Admiral also seen. Earlier I had the moth trap out for the first time and I had a few gems in there including a Herald and Twenty-plume Moth.

Another day, and yes, once again the clouds gather. However, for an hour or so the sun was out and it was pretty warm. In this window I found a Slow Worm warming itself. I have also been hoping to improve my previous images of Orange Underwing moths which are a very frustrating moth as they are often on the ground, but very well camouflaged, and when disturbed they fly off zigzagging about and normally flying skywards!! Today I got lucky with the rarer Light Orange Underwing which when disturbed resettled on the ground and stayed just long enough for a quick shot, which really does show their camouflage when on the ground. Several Peacocks were also on the wing before the sun went along with a few Brimstone, Small Tortoiseshell and Comma. Later in the day 2 Speckled Wood showed up. However, the hoped for Orange-tips didn't appear today.

I managed a record underside shot, but with the wind blowing she would not open up her wings for me. As I was there another Holly Blue flew over my head.



It was a very eventful week last week with too many pictures to sort out, so it was very frustrating for the computer to pick that week to go belly up!! Gradually sorting things now anyway. Every day I've been up to check on the Wall Brown pupa which has been changing daily, and by getting up there I've seen lots of other things as well. Last Wednesday I met up with Downland Boy to show him the pupa and to have a general walk in the area. Early on we were very lucky to come across a Grass Snake out in the open. We were careful not to panic the snake and it behaved nicely allowing some close up shots. I also saw my first Grizzled Skipper of the year, although pics had to wait until the next day.



On the Thursday I managed to get pictures of both Grizzled and Dingy Skippers as well as a Small Heath, the first for Sussex and only 2 days behind the British first in Surrey. On the way back to the car I spotted a smart Wall Brown, fantastic colour when newly emerged. This one also had an extra white spot on the forewing eye spot as well. A male Holly Blue was also a bonus, it was out of reach but I carefully pulled the foliage down and amazingly it didn't fly off.

A little different today with no Wall Brown!! In fact not even a butterfly. I did see some but I could only get out before the sun had warmed things up to get things really moving. I did try to get close to a Wall Brown that seemed a bit darker than usual, but I didn't get a good enough view to be sure if it was a bit different. Probably not!!

Lots of damselflies now on the move, I managed a few shots of an Azure Damselfly. I then came across a very fresh Pyrausta Nigrata, one of those tiny moths found on the Downland. Moving on I then spotted my first Broad Bodied Chaser dragonfly of the year. This one was also in my favourite stage with it being an immature male in the stage of the colour change to maturity.



Yesterday I went up to Bo Peep Bostal to do a Wall Brown count on a regular circuit. This slope is North facing and the butterflies are at least 2 weeks behind my normal patch at High and Over. In fact the High and Over first brood is now all but over already!! However, at Bo Peep Bostal almost all the Wall Browns were very fresh and there were lots of them with 69 counted.

The Common Blues on the Downs near me are looking really good at the moment. I've called up there both early and late in the day to try and get some better shots. I also had my first adonis of the year today.



I remembered that Guy had a Marbled White larva crossing the road and that I had mentioned that I should go and check out where I had found some earlier in the season. Most of the areas where I found them before were covered with no luck and I assumed that they had either pupated or were, as mentioned in the books, nocturnal in their later instars. I then went along to look at the pupa case of the Wall Brown that had presumably died, the case had gone, only the bit where the larva had attached itself to the grass stem still there, but beneath it was unbelievably a near fully grown Marbled White larva!! If the pupa was still attached it would have been touching the MW larva. The black stripe down the back was very interesting to watch as the stripe widened and narrowed all the time like a pulse going through it.





Thanks David and William. I was particularly pleased with the underside shot. Different tactics yesterday as I went up to get them roosting in the evening. Unfortunately I could have done with another 30 minutes or so but I had to get home to feed the wife!! The Marbled Whites were so wary flying off when approached, I missed one opportunity stupidly but managed just one single shot. Will have to try again a little later when hopefully they would have slowed down, or another very early start.



Today I was doing a butterfly survey for BC in private woodland. I was amazed at the numbers of Ringlet. They were all over the place. Early on I spotted an ab. Ringlet. No rings on the underwing, just a few dots so possibly ab. arete. I tried to get some pictures but with the sun coming out it just didn't settle again and then fighting with lots of other Ringlet it was impossible to keep with it. Very frustrating. Many very active Silver-washed Fritillaries as well with 3 females appearing to be ovapositing. Also a mating pair high in the trees being harassed by another male.




Once again a big thanks to you all for the comments regarding the Chalkhill Blue shot.


After 2 days of almost non stop rain it was good to get back up the hill once the heavy cloud had dispersed today. Lots of Marbled White and Chalkhill again. I noticed a pair of mating Marbled White and went to get a closer look and it immediately became apparent that the female was not normal. The brown tint that the females show was in this instance a deep orange-brown colour. It was hard to get a decent underside shot showing both forewing and hindwing and the one attached is a poor shot but it hopefully gives the idea how different it was. However, after a couple of minutes they climbed up a decent stem and then stayed put for the rest of the time they were still coupled which allowed several shots of them. Just before splitting up the female part opened her wings to show the brown on the leading edge. Once again this seemed a deeper brown than usual.












Several pairs of Chalkhill Blue were also mating, mostly deep in the grass but one pair once again were sitting high up.



If this is the case its the first drop in numbers following 8 years of steady growth. As far as photographing them goes I rarely try to photograph Wall Brown now as I have too many pictures of them and they are SO frustrating and life is too short!!

Talking about life being too short I was on the Downs this morning admiring the Chalkhill Blues again when I stumbled across a small area with 3 mating pairs in it. One of the pairs seemed a bit odd as the female had her wings spread wide open and she didn't seem quite right. Looking harder she was having her life taken away from her by a spider that was firmly attached to her. Meanwhile the male was totally unaware of what her predicament was and was carrying on regardless!!





Having said that the 'orange' colour mentioned in the description of flava was obvious and mentioned in my original post on 12 July.

That aside, yesterday in odd weather, the lull before the storm perhaps, although it was still breezy, I walked the 2 miles to see how the Wall Brown ova I found last week was doing. Unfortunately it appeared to have been parasitized with what seemed to be another ova attached to it. It then fell off the dead grass root where it had been laid last week. Shortly after I came across a quite fresh female Wall Brown which looked as though it was on an egg laying mission. I saw it go into a rabbit scrape where it paused for a few seconds before moving on again. Looking again at the grass roots there was an ova neatly attached, this one had a slight green shade to it which I haven't noticed before.





On the way to that area I came across a male Wall Brown trying to woo a female. She was not at all interested but the male kept at it and was very persistent until she went upside down in the grass. Immediately he lost interest and flew away.

This year is the best I have known for the 3rd brood with butterflies showing up in areas that normally only has the first 2 broods. On the walk I saw 6 Wall including one female. I have now also had 2 in the garden, the first time I have had the 3rd brood show here. Also yesterday there were plenty of Small Coppers, a few Brown Argus and Common Blue and a late Adonis Blue.
