Remember that you always have the option to focus manually! I think it is better to do that with macro photography, as you can be sure that you focus on the right bit! It's often a good idea to pre-focus the lens at the magnification you want and then rock yourself back and forwards until the subject is in focus, rather than changing the lens setting. I use a monopod to keep things steady, while still allowing me some freedom of movement.

The Sony/ex-Minolta lens is excellent - see <a href="http://www.kenrockwell.com/minolta/maxxum/100mm-f28.htm">http://www.kenrockwell.com/minolta/maxxum/100mm-f28.htm</a> for a review - and I certainly wouldn't change it on image quality grounds!

Mike is spot on of course the Minolta is a excellent Macro lens – as your lovely photos illustrate. I use manual focus a lot but I also find that I have to use my camera 'one handed' reasonably often making it impossible to focus manually. Many of the places and situations some of us find ourselves in trying to get a perfect butterfly shot can only be made possible by holding onto something with one hand and taking a photo with the other On occasion I also need to hold an obstacle out of the way with one hand and take the shot with the other.

A lot depends on your style of photography, some butterflies rarely sit still for long and auto focus can be a lot faster - making the difference between getting the shot or not. Ideally we would be able to use manual focus all of the time. If you really need auto focus for the reasons I've mentioned then it's worth checking out the Sigma. If you're able to use manual focus most of the time then there's definitely no reason to change anything.

FWIW on auto or not, your photos look very good to me.


### Slow-worm and Twists and Turns


At midday today I visited Mill Hill. The weather was cloudy and windy with occasional glimpses of sun. I was looking for the Walls, Small Heaths and Blues. I quickly spotted a Wall flying past which landed. When I tried to take a photo it flew off again and then started chasing a Small Heath! Sadly while trying to keep an eye on where both were landing I lost both for a while. I found the Wall twice more and on the first of these occasions it disturbed an Adonis Blue and the second a Green Hairstreak, again giving me choices about which to keep an eye on. So I saw my first Wall, Small Heath and Adonis Blue of the year. Final count was 1 Speckled Wood, 1 Wall, 1 Small Heath, 1 Brimstone, 1 Small Tortoiseshell, 2 Adonis Blues, 1 Grizzled Skipper, 3 Green Hairstreaks and about 10 Dingy Skippers. While leaving I came across a lifetime first slow-worm which was on the path. It was moving at all so I nudged it to make sure it was alive (it was). After never having seen any before I had to step over this one to get back to the car. I suppose that is part of the excitement of wildlife watching - you never know what you will come across.

#### Small Tortoiseshell Caterpillar

On Friday me and my sister took a short trip to Norfolk. We went in the morning to the Ted Ellis nature reserve and later on to Strumpshaw fen. The sun was shining and both places were alive with wildlife. In the first reserve we saw approx 12 Peacocks, 4 orange-Tips, 8 Brimstones, 1 Small Tortoiseshell, 4 Green-Veined Whites, damselflies, dragonflies, a grass snake and about 15 caterpillars on nettles which the very helpful warden identified for us as Small Tortoiseshell caterpillars. Then onto Strumpshaw fen and the surrounding area where I saw my first ever Swallowtail. We also saw approx 15 Peacocks, 4 Small Tortoiseshells, 2 Green-Veined Whites, 10 Brimstones, 4 Common Blue, 1 Holly Blue, 4 Orange-Tips and 1 Speckled Wood.






**Day 2 - 17th May**by Katrina, 18-May-14 10:07 PM GMT

Well really half day. Headed back to the Ted Ellis reserve for the morning. No Swallowtails but the same range of butterflies and caterpillars as the day before. We came across 3 emerging dragonflies and went back to look at them later in the morning. We think they may be scarce chasers. 2 Grass Snakes seen, 2 Cranes and 1 Kingfisher. Unfortunately I only had camera with macro lens with me. Then stopped off at Mill Road Cemetery Cambridge on the way back and saw 3 blue butterflies flying high up which I think were Holly Blues, two Speckled Woods and a few white butterflies.


### Painted Lady and Caterpillar Pests

I then went on for a quick stop in the Chantry Hill area of the Downs and saw 1 Wall Brown, 1 Painted Lady, 1 Green Hairstreak, 1 Brown Argus, 3 Small Heaths 4 Common Blues and 7 Dingy Skippers. I stopped at Mill Hill on the way home and saw a fox, 2 Red Admirals, a few Dingy Skippers and some Common Blues and Adonis Blues.
