Good Friday 18th April 2014

A Walk along the Wey Navigation Canal from Old Parvis Road, Dartnell Park, **West Byfleet** heading South for approx. 6miles (upstream) to High Bridge **Send, Surrey.**

Started off in West Byfleet at 9:30am. I spent the first ten minutes faffing about with my iphone trying to get my notes voice recorded.

Weather sunny but quite cool (9-14 degrees C). Forecast to cloud over by 2:00pm so I wanted to make the most of the morning.

Ideal weather for walking and if I ended up somewhere nice by lunchtime, should be good conditions for taking pictures of butterflies as well.

What more could I ask for?

The first part of my walk was along part of the Wey Navigation Canal lined with mature trees. By 9:55am I had seen my first butterfly of the day, in fact, two Speckled Woods in a sunny spot. I don't want to bore you so here is a picture:



9:58am Speckled Wood, West Byfleet, Surrey

I continued on past **Pyrford** and by 10:48am, I found a patch of nettles by Walsham Weir with 4 Peacocks and a Comma warming up in the morning sunshine.



10:36am Walsham Weir, River Wey, Surrey.

By 11:00am I had seen my first Orange Tip of the day and soon several more. Near Ripley, the landscape changes with grazed fields bordering the navigation.

Approaching Newark Lock there is a nice view of Newark Priory:

I saw Green Veined Whites, Peacocks & Orange Tips between Newark Lock & Papercourt Lock:

By Lunch Time I found a very good stretch of the tow path for butterflies near "High Bridge". I saw every species I had encountered along the way here plus a Small Tortoiseshell, Small White and my first Holly Blue of 2014! Θ . Once I got "my eye in" I spotted another 8 Holly Blues with individuals chasing each other near to the nettles and Willow Trees. I have made a couple of compilations to save space:

Special notes- I was expecting to see at least one Brimstone, I probably would have seen several more last month along this same stretch but I didn't see any.

I only saw 1 Small Tortoiseshell (They were still outnumbered by Commas and Peacocks).

Where I was on Friday, there must have been at least half a dozen different butterfly species (adults) using willow as a food source. I caught a Speckled Wood feeding (which I don't normally see).

I know it must be quite seasonal but I have never really seen for myself, adult butterflies using willow like this before. I was looking out for this behaviour after noticing pictures posted by others. There is certainly not much flowering buddleia around at this time of year

I took what I thought was a very ordinary picture of a Speckled Wood perching near the Purple Emperor "master tree" but found something else to make it a little more interesting:

Regarding BBC Breakfast report 06:50 on 4.5.14 The River Mole Survey of Flood Damage to the main flood channel.

This stretch of the River Mole is local to me. I grew up around here.

Basically, the part of the River Mole (lower reaches) filmed on the BBC Breakfast report did its job quite well in regard to carrying the water away quickly after the winter floods further upstream. The main flood channel is generally, not good for fish. It is too uniform in low water conditions to stop cormorants rampaging through fish stocks. The cormorants might otherwise keep to the local reservoirs as was the case many years ago or so I was told.


When the river is in spate, many of fish left for example, Roach, Bream, Perch, Pike, Chub & Dace along this stretch of the Flood Relief Channel literally get washed into the River Thames and can be found on an average year when the Thames hasn't flooded as well, near the Molesey Weir on the Thames in the Summer.

When designing these "flood channels", there needs to be more of a fish friendly approach including more areas where the fish can shelter when the river is in spate and more attempts to slow the water a little to reduce bank erosion but still keeping the potential to carry water away quickly. A good test for a newly designed flood channel is to wait 5 or 10 years and then see if there are many or any Roach and Bream present as these species suffer most from a "forced migration downstream" during floods.

It looked to me like most of the bank erosion took place a short distance downstream of the weir at Esher.

The lower stretch of the River Mole flooded more frequently 35 years ago, despite the ever changing river course. Back then it was a wildlife haven and the weirs were fully automatic. I think the Environment Agency must do better in the future when designing similar flood channels.

Turning my attention to Butterflies. Regarding the picture below taken on 4.5.14. I know it looks pretty but Oil Seed Rape on the river banks? Is this a good plant to have here? I would suggest that it might not be the best apart from its aesthetic appeal. Any more information on this would be much appreciated.

I spent some time at Bookham Common in Surrey. It was great to see my first Silver Washed Fritillary of the year as well as lots of newly emerged Limenitis camilla. They are out about half a month earlier compared to last year which probably means the Purple Emperors will be out earlier too. Here is a "space saver" compilation...

I was practicing using my new lightweight tripod that I bought on ebay for £15. It is hard work. I prefer to use the viewfinder for a "quick snap" rather than the LCD screen which I find takes longer to find the subject. I managed OK with the LCD screen at mid canopy level with the Limenitis camilla & SWF but I would have been on my knees using the viewfinder as the tripod is only 1.25m high.

I am almost 2m tall & the Purple Emperor I want to photograph lives near the top of 20m high Oak trees. Zooming in to something about the size of a single oak leaf aprox. 30m away creates image stabilisation issues so I think I really need a tripod which I can set up at about 1.8m high. Here is another compilation of butterflies I saw today...

If you haven't done so, **[b]please do look at my White Admiral video** [/b]from 13th June. To merge the video clips, prune out the worst bits and add some text and moving still images, for me this takes about as long at home as it does in the field taking the footage, just to get it up to what I consider to be a reasonable standard. I have edited it again and reposted it.

I had another day off work today and went back to Bookham Common in Surrey just to see how hard it would be to find the butterflies with cloud cover (in fact, the sun did not "come out" at all for the whole time I was there). It was half an hour before I saw my first butterfly. I stood in a woodland clearing for 15 minutes and just waited. A Red Admiral eventually fluttered down from the mid-canopy and briefly landed on my shoulder before it returned from where it came from. I smiled and said "thank you". Fortunately there was no one else around to hear me talking to the butterfly! elected it was best to move on and head to some of the more slightly more open areas of the common on the woodland edge. I found a couple of "dopey" Meadow Browns, Ringlets and large skipper. On Friday I was distracted by the White Admirals when following a Ringlet so today I relaxed and spent some time taking pictures.

It is nice to catch the Ringlets when fresh, they just look so much better. This one had quite big eye spots:

Thanks for the contribution Mike, a monopod, I had not thought of that. A very interesting idea.

Thanks Pauline. I managed to sneak down to Bookham Common this evening after work and can confirm the early emergence of Purple Emperors (not that the early sightings were in doubt, anyway). I had the ride to myself apart from one dog walker and two cyclists. With all due respect to Rob Hill, (he took some amazing "in flight" pictures with his hand held camera and special lens) I knew where Rob Hill took his pictures from and I set my tripod up in the same place where the grass was slightly trodden down . I also swatted a few mosquitoes that I think Rob might have missed! The clouds fizzled out and I was still taking pictures of a Purple Emperor after 7.00pm in the canopy before I gave up. I have loads of video clips to sift through, edit and sort. I will probably compile a new Purple Emperor video in the autumn when I have more time. I have not replayed all the footage yet, if I did try and sort it all now, I would just end up very tired for work. Just to encourage you a little, this was about as good as it got picture wise. My camera only has a 50x optical zoom but a 200x digital zoom and this is about as close as I can get at 200x from approx. 30 meters away from the butterfly (allowing for a bit of cropping of the image):

Mine was the first car in the common car park just before 8.00am and parked next to the sign saying "no parking between dusk and dawn".

The Common is very beautiful at this time in the morning. hardly anyone around and I still want to beat my personal record of seeing a Purple Emperor before 8.00am.

It was just a little bit "nippy".

The plan was to start off walking some of the slightly lower woodland rides in the morning where there are a few more willow trees & try and spot any newly emerging Purple Emperor's before they fly up the hill. Also I have the added interest of seeing other butterflies away from the "Master Tree". I had however stopped at my parents house for breakfast for a cup of tea so was a little late.

8:02am -White Admiral, 8:04am -Silver Washed Fritillary. Soon I saw loads of Limenitis camilla in the Oak Trees. When the sun is low in the sky in the morning, the butterflies start off in the canopy warming up. I even saw a meadow brown at approx. 8 meters above ground level in a tree! I saw my first confirmed sighting this year of a Purple Hairstreak. This was not photographed but I have a feeling there are many around. I took some interesting (for me) video footage of a Red Admiral taking minerals from the gravel track at the high point of the common & some Speckled Woods "harassing" each other. This ended in nothing and they both looked rather tired at the end of it. One Limenitis Camilla showed some interest in the horse manure but I don't think it was really fresh enough!

In all I saw 26 White Admiral & 8 Silver Washed Fritillaries (all male) amoung other butterflies. I was practicing sneaking up on WA's & SWF's just using the optical zoom on my old camera (50x max) and not using the "lazy" digital zoom (200x). I was reasonably happy not to have seen any Purple Emperors.

I left the common late morning after spotting my first "butterfly tourist" 🐸 Best Wishes

I spent some time at (yes, you guessed it) Bookham Common yesterday with my son, Alex.

We saw 4 or 5 Purple Emperor in a couple of different locations. This doesn't mean that there are loads around but I have learnt (mainly from last year), where to park my car & look $\stackrel{\square}{\ensuremath{\Theta}}$. I would guess a slightly staggered emergence this year is quite likely. I thought I saw a female Purple Emperor last year as late as 18th August, quite along time after the last properly recorded sighting.

I was helping Alex use my old camera which unfortunately I never fully understood myself! We arrived on the common, late Sunday morning at around 11:30am and fitted in quite nicely with all the other "butterfly tourists". I was still interested in Red Admirals taking minerals from the gravel track. 

It was a good learning day for me, increasing my camera minimum shutter speed to help reduce image blur. Rob was very kind and quick also to help passers by who were interested. One funny moment came when a chap was looking for White Admirals and just about as soon as he left, one landed on the path in front of us! Use I am going to do a bit more analysis as to why my new camera was taking a poorer quality picture at a similar distance compared with my other camera. I think it was probably to do with my camera settings but I am not sure yet.



Yesterday I was trying to be a bit more like **Rob Hill** who takes great "inflight" Purple Emperor pictures. 😉

The method is to lock the focus on a leaf at a distance where the butterflies are expected to be seen and then set a very fast shutter speed on the camera to eliminate much of the blurring caused by the Purple Emperors moving quickly and camera shake. It is then just a case of point and shoot adjusting the zoom to suit if the lens is not fixed.

There is a balance to be had. If one is zoomed in close, one is likely to miss the shot completely but there is a better chance of capturing a good picture without the need for much cropping on the PC. If one is zoomed out there is a much better chance of capturing the scene but the butterflies may appear small.

My camera has a shutter speed priority mode where one can set the shutter speed and the ISO and aperture are automatically adjusted to suit. This works well as long as it is not too dark!

Here was my first attempt with the camera set on P mode by mistake with the focus locked but the shutter speed was not really fast enough:

Here is another attempt with the camera set to "shutter speed priority mode". A much clearer shot but not a good composition. More practice needed!


26.9.2014 Hibernating Peacock Butterfly


Last Friday (26.9.2014) I came across a hibernating Peacock Butterfly in the top corner of a concrete garage I was surveying and was still in the same position on Monday (yesterday). What was interesting about this, and might be a talking point was that it was approx. 20°C outside and sunny with Cabbage White butterflies still on the wing! So Peacocks prefer to come out in March when the temperature is 15°C! It just shows what a "strong body clock" Peacocks have and are well suited to hibernating with the English climate, unlike for example, the Camberwell Beauty which appears to respond completely differently. Maybe the Peacock was depressed after the buddleia stopped flowering?


On a different note, I am still editing butterfly video clips which are going to keep me going through the autumn & winter. I don't want to quickly post something if I think I can do a better job taking my time editing the footage.



Thank you very much for your feedback comment. My raw video clips were originally quite a bit longer than shown in the submitted edited video. I did not want to make the viewer too "seasick" as my hands were shaking a bit when taking the footage, partly due to being a bit nervous in trying to capture an infrequent event. Why digital camera does have some inbuilt image stabilisation which does help a bit. Purple Hairstreaks might not stay on the ground for very long unless there is something wrong with them so running around with a tripod was out of the question for me at that time. I think Purple Hairstreaks can be quite common but usually congregate in Oak Tree Canopies so are often not seen by most people.

Here is a link to part 2 (My second Purple Hairstreak video) http://youtu.be/DLn_qT2qpv0 The aim of this second video is to give some people a better understanding of this butterflies behaviour up in the tree canopy rather than to provide people with lots of pretty pictures (which is very difficult anyway when filming at such a distance with a digital SLR camera).

I hope you find it interesting. One should also should understand that the original video footage was hours long and has been compressed into about 2 minutes to try and keep ones attention.

On a hot clear sunny day in July as the sun goes down, canopy butterflies such as Purple Emperors and Purple Hairstreaks find themselves competing for the last sunny spot on the south west side of the tree canopy near the highest point on the hill. So at that time there is quite often conflict between the two species.

I have even more video footage of the Purple Emperors which once uploaded to youtube will eventually replace the 5 second long clip esubmitted in 2013.

I have saved some of my best Purple Emperor Vs Purple Hairstreak footage for that video (not wanting to repeat too much)

just to "get something out there".

The aim of these videos is not to enlighten the experts but to present something to help the average person get a better understanding of this butterflies behaviour in the tree canopy after about 12:30pm 🐸 I intend to remove the 2013 clip I uploaded unless anyone objects.

The 18th July was the last day I recorded this butterfly at Bookham Common this year. Although it was seen for several days or even weeks after, I decided I had enough good footage. I filled about four 16GB SDHC cards with video clips, some of which were over 20 minutes long. I then used my camera to divide the raw clips (I am still doing this), saving the best bits and deleting the bits with nothing on before downloading to PC and using simple editing software to produce a finished version, PLEASE ENJOY!

I have just uploaded to youtube my second Purple Emperor video.

Part 2 contains most of my Purple Emperor Vs Purple Hairstreak footage which wasn't shown in the Purple Hairstreak video.

The Purple Emperor involved was mostly the same individual on the 10th July, recognisable with a tiny nick out of its wing.

From my observations I noticed a good rotation of male butterflies from day to day holding territory in the canopy (pm).

In 2014 I didn't see more than 3 male Emperors at once chasing each other and there appeared to be no more than approx. half a dozen at once in a reasonably small area. My biggest regret has been not managing to film a dragonfly chase or more bird chases. These tend to happen at "break neck" speed. I was often left fumbling around with my camera while this happened.

I have been experimenting adding music but not included it yet when publishing it to the public. Some of the clips have the volume turned off as the listener probably doesn't want to hear the sound of me chewing gum the whole time ! igoredown

As with all of my videos, if you spot something that is factually incorrect or needs editing please feel free to let me know and wipe the smile off my face ! I am a bit of a "one man band" with these videos and so am a bit prone to making mistakes and posting the publically. I will then of course do the necessary edits and replace the older video.

I have removed the link to my very short 2013 Purple Emperor video. I don't think many people will miss it ! 😀

With the video footage I ended up having two SLR Cameras with me.

One was set up on a tripod second guessing where the Emperors were going to appear, just letting it run, adjusting the zoom occasionally to try and get some better action. The second was hand held, trying to get some decent pictures.

I think that probably the most interesting thing about my videos is the way I have combined the fixed pictures & video stills with the moving footage. I also think that my work is probably a good example of what can be achieved with an SLR Camera set on maybe not quite the best settings! I am sure there are several experts out there looking at my footage and smiling realising they can do quite a bit better with even more specialised equipment and software. And I am pleased if I can inspire others to do better.

Getting the footage was quite time consuming and as I am quite tall, trying to avoid "Purple Emperor Neck" was a problem. One thing that I tried which worked quite well was putting some homemade leg extensions on my tripod giving me the ability to set it up at about 1.7-1.9m high. Anything less would have given me "Purple Emperor Back" as well!

Hill Farm Territory, Bookham Common


I have started compiling several images of individual Purple Emperor Butterflies from 2014 which can be identified by wing damage to try and get a better understanding of the rotation of individuals holding territory on a daily or weekly basis. My guess and analysis from observations is that there is quite a good rotation of individuals holding territory on a daily basis and just because one male has a territory in a particular tree one afternoon, does not necessarily mean that it will return to the same tree the following afternoon. The first butterfly I saw with wing damage was on 2nd July and there were still some fairly "clean looking" individuals around on 18th July.

The 6th July was noted as being quite windy in the canopy.

Here are a few pictures to give one an idea of what I have been doing but more help is needed to be sure:



I have been having a look at some of my big digital zoom images. This White Admiral picture had a whopping digital zoom X4. As it was perched up in a tree, getting close was not an option and the digital zoom helped give me a large target area to focus on.

I do realise however that the best results are not achieved with digital zoom as any blurring is exaggerated.

This picture was taken on 13th June 2014 when the butterfly was probably on the wing for no more than a day or two. Some people did go looking for White Admirals at the Bookham Commons near the end of July and were surprised not to see very many and the ones they did see were quite worn & scruffy looking individuals.

In 2013 White Admirals did emerge several weeks later after a cold February and early Spring.

I only have a cheap camera, so I only use zoom in desperation, ie. a rare butterfly that is not likely to come close enough for a normal shot. Invariably these shots are deleted because of poor quality. But this year i got one shot that worked, I saw a Purple Emperor, some distance away, fly up from the ground to near the top of a tall Oak. Zoom was the only answer, the Butterfly was hardly visible from the ground, the result is a hand held shot that didn't blur!!. That shot is on page two of my diary.



To be honest Trevor, I was helped a bit with a cheap tripod when taking this shot. When using a big zoom, it is nice to have a large target to focus on but if the target appears to be moving all over the place, exaggerated by wobble and hand shake, that doesn't help image quality. One can try using a faster shutter speed in such situations to get a better result.

My Canon PowerShot SX50 HS has 12.1 Mega Pixels. I think with this image, an optical zoom X50 was used plus a digital zoom X4 making the image 200x and just over 3 Mega Pixels (12.1 divided by 4, correct me if I am wrong). I don't think I cropped this image at all.

I am told not to enlarge pictures too much when using digital zoom. (I am not sure people really want to see the individual pixels, anyway Θ , Θ)
This is the same picture but I have reduced it in size by 25% to compensate for the big digital zoom.
Hopefully one should notice the difference when clicking on the picture to enlarge it.

Hi Phil,

I would imagine that 4x zoom means 4x magnification of length (width and height) not area, so in fact it's 12.1 divided by 16 = 0.75 Megapixels. The image still looks perfectly usable at the size you've presented it here, but you're right that when enlarged the limitations are more visible.

Digital zoom is generally no better than taking an unzoomed image and cropping it later, but as you've explained, if it makes the target bigger in the viewfinder it can still be useful.

The Tunnel Car Park at the Bookham Commons does happen to be close to the station so I guess that a decision was made a while ago by the National Trust to charge maybe to stop commuters parking there all day. I think the first time I went to Bookham, I ended up paying & parking in the station car

park having similar problems to yourself. I might be wrong but I think the good old National Trust Sticker can also be displayed in the Tunnel Car Park instead of paying by phone on the spot. There is a free car park nearer the high points of the Commons but those supporting the National Trust understandably may not wish to direct newcomers there hence all the online info about the Tunnel Car Park.

I think it's all a bit of a "tongue in cheek smiley" () but I don't want to make a fuss about it in case the National Trust start charging in the other car parks (one of which I frequently use).

I am currently sifting through lots of pictures and video clips of Silver Washed Fritillaries (SWFs) taken at Bookham Common this year in order to hopefully produce something that is visually informative regarding **flight times and nectaring habits**. Hopefully I will get some spare time at Christmas to finish this off.

My plan is to compliment my video with some recording data available from **Butterfly Conservation**, Surrey. I am not sure yet exactly how much work is involved. The process goes something like this:

Rename video clips and photos putting them in date order

Convert all video clips to MP4 format.

Split MP4 video clips into usable chunks using free software available online.

Compile video using editing software and insert edited photos.

Keep replaying the video, editing as necessary until I am reasonably sure all data included is correct and any "free" music added is properly credited Post to youtube and then link to UK Butterflies if I feel it is appropriate to do so.

Here is a picture in which I got too close to crop widescreen, keeping all of the butterfly in the picture.

I have put a frame around it to try and give the feeling of more space (and for my own vanity $\stackrel{ extbf{@}}{ extbf{ extbf{ extit{0}}}}$)
