We were just about above cloud level, in brilliant sunshine, but within seconds a thick mist would descend which would then lift just as quickly, allowing the hot sunshine to return.

 $During \ the \ misty \ spells \ any \ Butterflies \ in \ the \ area \ would \ instantly \ settle, \ and \ this \ allowed \ my \ best \ chance$ of getting close to a Brassy Ringlet. Unfortunately the mist was so dense that photography was impossible, but I waited by my chosen Brassy. In almost an instant the sun returned and several quick shots were obtained before the Ringlet was off. At least the three grabbed shots were enough to show the rainbow like iridescence on the left hand forewing.

I later found a mating pair of Brassy Ringlets which were too engrossed to make a quick escape.





( they had warmed up by 9.00 when I left ). My first Pearl was found basking on a Birch sapling, before I was able to approach it, it flew down onto some bluebells. For a while, in the building heat, it seemed as though there were Pearls everywhere, but my images suggest only two were present at my first location. Two more high speed Pearls were spotted on the way back to the car, in a different area.

An added bonus came in the form of a mating pair of Speckled Yellow Moths, and a female Speckled wood searching for somewhere to deposit her eggs.











Good to see the Pearls are out Trevor, at long last. 4 Now we need the heat to ease off a bit to make them a bit more sluggish!



After half an hour or so it became clear that finding Glanvilles in good condition was going to be difficult. Indeed all that were in good condition were the females, most males were severely worn. This was the case at all three sites visited.

The next stop was Shepherds Chine, here I witnessed chases that would have been impossible when the Glanvilles first emerged several weeks ago. ie, Glanville and Large Skipper/ Meadow Brown and Small Heath. This demonstrated the transitional period we are now in.

On to Compton Bay, where even more land has slipped into the sea, since my last visit. As it was now mid afternoon and quite hot, attempts at photography was useless, so it was over to the ice cream van !.

Anyone thinking of visiting the IOW for Glanvilles, perhaps next year would a better bet. Trevor.


Strumpshaw Fen.

The information gained was a little vague, it was suggested that we took the next road on the left to the doctors garden. We passed a track but carried on for some distance looking for a road!. Time wasted, we eventually found the doctors garden and the Sweet Williams, but no Swallowtails.

We ventured on to a large area of low growing Sallow and wild flowers. By now it was hot, so I sat down under an Oak , and waited for Doug to catch up.

Behind the Oak I noticed a steep drop down to a low, very green area. By chance I saw a Swallowtail flying in this low lying meadow. Further investigation revealed another Swallowtail had found the first one and a chase was in progress. When they broke off, one Swallowtail landed on the tip of a Ragwort for the first of many shots. Throughout the morning three Swallowtails were found, and all three landed in a perfect position for photography and gave us several hours of pure entertainment. Unfortunately all three had sustained some wear and damage, never the less it was great to be among them for the first time.

The rest of the long weekend was a write off owing to extensive cloud cover.

One exact spot attracted several individuals over several days, including Mondays ab., so was it to do with the minerals on a particular stone or did that tiny area contain something like dried urine. The experts, will no doubt, have their theories.

Yesterday Doug and myself went over to Knepp. It was to be a morning of diverse species. On arrival I found two, low down, Purple Hairstreaks, one of which, a female, partially opened up before taking off. Paul Fosterjohn found a grounded Emperor, otherwise PE sightings were

in the trees, or in the air.

The most spectacular event took place at lunchtime as we got into our cars.

A male chasing a female at high speed along the road, it was obviously a rejection flight as there was a brief ' face off ' on the tarmac, then onto the grass verge where the male took the hint, leaving the female upside down in the grass !.



I have long been convinced that East Sussex is one of this countries top Butterfly hot-spots. This proved to be true this morning, starting off with Purple Hairstreaks, and ending with Wall Browns and Chalkhill Blues, all within a short drive.

My first stop off was at Abbots wood where two Purple Hairstreaks were found basking, this time, and more appropriately, on Oak leaves. Many other Butterflies were present, but it was a fairly fresh female Silver Washed Fritillary that had my attention.

I then took a short drive up to High and Over, for Wall Browns. Here it was very warm and the three Walls seen were very active and busy seeing off themselves and any Gate Keepers that got in the way. Only an underside shot was possible, as they closed up on landing. On the North facing slope of High and Over, Chalkhill Blues can usually be found, and were found in abundance this morning. They seem to be able to detect Human presence from ten paces away, and fly off before the chance of selecting one to photograph!

I have never met you in person so thought it might be you talking about your picture. But no, it transpired it was someone else with a similar experience to you. It was a complete coincidence. It was even the same forewing but in his case the flaw in the wing was white rather than black as yours is. He said he had read somewhere that such marks can be due to problems in the pupa stage that then manifest as blemishes on the butterfly. I am not qualified to comment but thought I would relay the info anyway.



Among the numerous Adonis Blues, it was not difficult to find some fresh ones. I only explored a small area of the vast Grassland yesterday, but judging by what I saw, the site could give Mill Hill a run for it's money as far as Adonis Blues are concerned.

When I arrived at my Daughters yesterday, I went straight up to the Church grounds and was surprised to find some male Wall Browns still in good condition.

The weather is a write off today ( Sunday ), but when it improves I shall pop up there again.



Leaving the car I noticed 11c. on the dashboard thermometer. I need not have worried as two Clouded Yellows were found straight away, all told six were found.

Very few were fresh, but all were in good condition.

The real prize today was a very fresh, placid, Painted Lady, intent on nectaring,

this lovely Butterfly just glided and floated between various Knapweed flowers,

and allowed very close approach on many occasions.

Only one of the many Red Admirals flying around, settled for the camera, this turned out to be a worn ab. bialbata. Surprisingly for Southwick, no Common Blues were found today.

A first class day out.

I very soon realised that I was looking at my first ever ab.

The second ab. Lugenda was found by me four days later. A small group of us, including Katrina and Andrew555, watched as this particular Emperor promptly flew into a nearby bush, we waited patiently hoping it would return to the ground, which it fortunately did. As we clicked away, Andrew said " this one looks different ", but in the heat the Butterfly

was reluctant to open up for a proper look, but some ground level closed wing shots confirmed another ab. This Emperor only flicked it's wings open briefly and we all got some bad shots that confirmed ab. Lugenda.

My last big surprise came back at Abbots Wood. Although I was deliberately looking for Purple Hairstreaks, it was quite a shock to find a couple quickly and easily. Out of eleven early morning visits, Purple Hairstreaks were found low down on eight occasions. Unfortunately it was too late in their flight season for fresh specimens. Something I hope to put right in 2019!.
