





Sheepleas, near West Horsley in Surrey, is another of my favourite places. It repays repeated visits throughout the year. It has a mosaic of different habitats from woodland to meadows, with each meadow having its own identity, flora and fauna.

The Nettle meadow (as the name implies) has vast swathes of nettles and thistles and is ideal for Vanessids. The adjacent Cowslip meadow hosts the flora you would associate with chalk or limestone and accordingly has a colony of Chalk Hill Blue.

This was a late season treat; as soon as I entered the Nettle Meadow, I had two surprises.






Birthday Blue Tit Rescue

Los Romanes, Spain, May 2016

Los Romanes is situated in the hills above Malaga, about 25km northeast as the crow flies and overlooks the Vinuela Reservoir (Enbalse de la Vinuela) and the start of the Sierra Tejeda mountains. It's a small, sleepy place, perfect for relaxing. The view alone is worth coming for; this was from my hotel balcony.



The walk up to the ruins was soundtracked by skylarks and there were plenty of butterflies. I saw Spanish Marbled Whites hilltopping at the top and generally being difficult to approach, Large White, Small White, Clouded Yellow, Small Tortoiseshell, Swallowtail, Lulworth Skipper, Meadow Brown, (*ssp hispulla*), Southern Gatekeeper and a new species for me – Spanish Gatekeeper.

I started along the path shown in the first photo above. This led around the slope and to a short tunnel through the hillside. Either side of the tunnel, I found another new species for me: Lorquin's Blue, *Cupido lorquinii*. This species is closely related to the Small Blue and Osiris Blue and restricted to the south of Iberia and North Africa.

Your first common blue in particular looks a very good candidate for *P. celina*, which certainly flies there. Common blues probably fly there too – they are not particularly closely related and can overlap. In my experience, first brood *celina* is the same size as common blue but has noticeably darker margins, and broader, especially towards the apex. But as I've never killed one to check, my experience could be wrong anyway.
