


We planned to make a return visit this Sunday, and then this morning I also saw Pauline's diary post, with the Glanvilles she saw there yesterday.

We spent an hour without seeing any butterflies at all and were on the verge of calling it quits, when it brightened up a bit and felt a tad warmer. All of a sudden we saw some Common Blues in flight, so we resumed our search with renewed optimism. Within ten minutes I'd found our first Glanville, a really fresh looking male. We then spent a very enjoyable hour, during which we found a total of six Glanvilles, all of which I think were males, all in mint condition, a very pleasing result.

White-letter Hairstreaks

We finally decided to make the long trek around the M25 to (hopefully) see some White-letter Hairstreaks up close and personal, for the first time ever.

On arrival at Hadleigh the wind was much stonger than the forecast 20mph, it was not much short of a gale force easterly 🥝 After parking in the station car park we made our way along the footpath towards the country park. It took all of five minutes to spot our first WLH which was sitting on a bramble leaf, which was unfortunately being blown all over the place by the strong gusty wind. This turned out to be the pattern for the day and what should have been easy shots of WLH posing perfectly, were ruined by the poxy wind. 😂

The problem with photographing Hairstreaks when nectaring, is that they constantly pirouette on the nectar source, allowing few square-on photo opportunities, which is extra impossible when the plant (they are nectaring on) is being blown violently to the left and right by as much as a foot!

Having said all that, by persevering we did manage to get some reasonable shots, which we were very pleased with. Here's a few from the many taken.

Today I found two Puss moth larvae, I've not seen them before (apart from in Paulines PD 😃) what an amazing larva they are. This is a first for me, and makes you realize what non-moth-ers (like me) are missing out on 💝



MH Down 2nd August

My sister was staying with us for a few days and wanted to take a trip to MH Down, so off we went, our first trip out for a while. I had looked at the forecast before we went, which promised light cloud in the afternoon, but we arrived in full sunshine and 25 degree temps with a fair breeze.

Upon entering the site the first butterfly we encountered was, not surprisingly, a Painted Lady, which proved difficult to approach and was very lively.





There were quite a few across the site.

Walking along the footpath we found a group of Brimstones, both male and female, busy nectaring in preparation for hibernation. Being so preoccupied they allowed a close approach.



I was lining up for a shot of a female nectaring on a Scabious flower, when another settled on the same flowerhead.



There were plenty of Chalkhill Blues around, both male and female, but they were very lively in the hot conditions. There were also a few very fresh second brood Common Blues and Brown Argus.

And a couple of Small Blues, including this female ovipositing on Kidney Vetch.



We saw a few fresh Peacocks and a single Red Admiral, which appeared to have had a hard life. No Small Torts were seen.

We also found two Clouded Yellows, our first of the year, nectaring on Knapweed flowers. As usual they didn't spend long on each flowerhead and were very touchy, so it was a case of trying to second-guess which would be the next one they landed on.





It was a nice afternoon out at a lovely site that we've not visited for some time.

4th August

A trip to Noar Hill today looking for Brown Hairstreaks, but despite a careful search of the site, we found none. However we did find enough other species to keep us occupied.

Only a few years ago the Hemp Agrimony would be covered with nectaring Peacocks, Red Admirals, Small Tortoiseshells and Commas estate there were several Peacocks and Red Admirals to be seen on this occasion. Some lovely fresh Painted Ladies did help to make up for the lack of the other species.









There were plenty of Brimstones however.



Second brood Common Blue and Brown Argus did not appear as plentiful as in previous years, although several fresh examples of each were seen.

This Common Blue was carrying a couple of Trombidium Breei mites.

The real surprise was finding this male Chalkhill Blue, the first that I've ever seen at Noar, it would be interesting to know where he originated from.

21 st August

Another trip to Noar today, to look for that 'needle in a haystack' the Brown Hairstreak. We scoured the site looking in all the usually reliable places, but

once again we drew a blank. They really do appear to be a bit thin on the ground this year! We moved on to another area and I went off to look in a side pit while Cathy looked elsewhere. Having no luck, I retraced my steps until I found Cathy again. When I got closer she quietly called me over as she had found a Brown Hairstreak nectaring on some hemp agrimony. When I joined her I could see the beautiful fresh female which she had found.









She was reluctant to open her wings, and then only to this degree!

The BH was very easy going, but it was not easy to get a good shot as firstly the wind was blowing the flower all over the place, and also she had her head buried deep in the blooms most of the time. She stayed nectaring for at least an hour, giving some other enthusiasts a chance to get some shots. The site was very quiet on the butterfly front, which was rather surprising given the wealth of nectar sources! During our search we found plenty of Brimstones nectaring, in the usual place.



This one appeared to have some extra underwing markings, something I've not noticed before.

We also found a few Common Blues(male and female), Small Heaths, Brown Argus, Small and Large Whites and a couple of Red Admirals and Peacocks. Nice finally catching up with you P.
