

We visited Scotland in 2013, from 30th May to 4th June and found our first ever Chequered Skippers at Glasdrum Wood. (It doesn't seem that long ago). We visited other sites further north first (Loch Arkaig and Glen Loy) but drew a blank at both of these. We decided to visit Shian Wood near the end of our stay, hoping (like you) to find some Marsh Frits, but unlike yourself, we saw none. We also didn't see any Chequered Skippers at Shian, perhaps they had a late emergence in 2013.

The other interesting thing is that we had mainly good weather, (apart from the day we were at Glasdrum), but during the five days we spent in Scotland we didn't encounter a single Midge! I wonder if it was a late year for Midges too?

6-9th June 2018

Ware Cliffs, Lyme Regis, Devon/Dorset

I always thought the colonies of Wood Whites along the Dorset/Devon coast here were particularly interesting, I'd been to the Branscombe cliffs about 20 years ago and seen them there but that was before my butterfly infatuation took hold. Sure we've got them up here in Surrey, but on the cliffs? All that wind buffeting them around, they never look like the strongest of fliers...

And as a bonus, one of the really rare Tiger Beetles is also found here in exactly the same habitat...well close enough. Time to go and have a look. Also noted from previous readings is that this colony of Wood Whites is moving into Dorset with the colony on the county boundary. I do have a very precise GPS but still couldn't work out exactly where the boundary is! Anyways its helped Dorsets Wood Whites records because that counties colonies are now foundering on the precipice of extinction..all good, not really...

I remember noting records of sometimes vast amounts of Wood Whites here and always thought that that needs to be seen.

Off I trundled, camping at a small farm just outside of Lyme I was able to walk to the cliffs.

The weather, although warm, was murky and sea misty and i knew I needed sun to lift the Woodies.

I did walk the undercliff to Seaton from here and having walked it several times in the past a good opportunity, whilst the weather was dank, to walk it again was seen, so i did.

Quite an oppressive walk, its pretty much 8 miles of this, much like a long walk through deciduous woodland anywhere, but quite distinct in that once committed you have to finish it or turn back, no way off half way through and therefore not many people. And when you pop out on the Seaton end, Orchids arrive.

You do need to have spent time as a mountain goat to avoid the crevices and be very nimble footed. And also much of it is simply inaccessible so actually monitoring a butterfly colony here, I would imagine, be very difficult.

Anyways,my love of Orthoptera is well documented and this year held some good stuff for me. And the odd Arachnid.

Work was becoming heavy and my butterfly antics were quickly diminishing.

Late Summer 2018

Southern Oak Bush crickets have established themselves in Southern Britain over the last decade and the long hot summer seemed to bring, these normally arboreal crickets, into lower foliage ie gardens, cars etc

Its mad to think that when I was a kid and my interest in Crickets and Grasshoppers was set, we had and always had the same amount of species in this country since books were written!, then in the last 20 years we have had some incredible expansions of previously rare Orthoptera and several new species added to the Fauna book of Britain. Three new confirmed breeding species in the last 20 years and that equates to a 10% rise in known species in this country, remarkable. Somethings going on..... Southern Oak Bush crickets being one of the new species in the last few years.

Wingless and unable to spread on the wind, clearly using other means to move across from the continent, but its likely they were here before but unable to breed, now are fully able to breed and conditions are right for it to colonise. I guess it will never be able to be known if it has an impact on our native Oak Bush cricket and hopefully they can co habit together. Also the native Oak Bush cricket came down from the trees in late summer, found both species a lot last year in August.

And Wasp spiders are everywhere these days, used to be so rare. I counted over 200 webs at Rye harbour in August, just amazing, my friend got a photo of one trussing up a Grey bush cricket, and that is a reasonably strong and big cricket. Probably quite a major dent in the insect predator world.

Got a bit arty with a female Speckled Bush cricket, always luck involved in finding these, they do not stridulate, they do however sun bathe, so inspection of nettle and bramble thickets on sunny August mornings and evenings can yield dividends.

And one of the jewels of aberrations in the Grasshopper world is finding a Rufous rufous Grasshopper, and although its more purple than rufous it certainly roles off the tongue better. And this coloration is normally only found in the more Western colonies of Dorset and Devon, so to find one in a Kentish colony, actually made my year, and may well be the first colour variant of this species in Kent, somethings going on. Rufous's are diagnostically noteable by their white tipped clubbed antenna. Easy distinguishing feature.

I've been after the Early Spider Orchid colony here for a while now and although not out of reach for a day trip from where I live(Sussex). I'd always wanted to find them with the my sister, who lives in Dover, and who with I stay every Easter. So wandering down to Samphire Hoe is always a joy and of course the added benefit of butterflies, always exposed and difficult to stay wind free, perseverance can pay dividends. Samphire was the additional bit of the British Isles, that was formed when all the Channel Tunnel spoil was placed here to form what we have now(although there were old coal mine workings here before). A quick look at the rangers siteings board said Dingy Skippers and Clouded Yellows....hello for the Cloudeds...yep. First off were the Speckled Woods on the sheltered side of the cliff tops, all pristine and fresh, like many of the butterflies this weekend.

Once down to the reserve, and still very Winter bleak looking, and with a stiff Easterly wind it was difficult to note any areas that were sheltered enough, but in the far Western corner the first butterflies were beginning to congregate. First noted were the Dingys, my first of this year.

Hello Dave,
Good report from Samphire Ho! I see that you,re struggling with the Early Spiders. May I suggest that if you do manage to get there again instead of going "over the top" you go through the far Car park (where there are generally a few to be seen) and follow the path that leads alongside the railway line, after a few steps you should begin to see the orchids on either side of the path, keep looking mainly to your left,

but for me the best area is actually along the beach ,you go through the metal fence and along the small raised concrete path ,when it finishes and you hit the beach ,look along the base of the cliff ,at first in the hollows ,and as you proceed towards the concrete dwelling ,they are a little higher up the chalk cliff. We saw 30 + Early Spiders here a couple of weeks back and they should now be at near peak . also along the beach section you can find Adonis ,Small ,Common Blues and brown Args, and Green Hairstreaks. I posted a few shots of various Early Spiders at Samphire Ho ,last year Good Hunting! Regards Allan.W.

My Adonis mission for the weekend was now in full tilt, and Malling Down holds a good colony. Day a two halves really, murky humid morning, sunny lovely afternoon. Decided to get stuck into the combe at Malling, which, as people know is extremely steep to say the least, and quite a work out on these 51 year old legs , stayed in the Southern spur at the top of the combe, the habitat here is a superb example of Southern Downland, unimproved. At the top in the bramble thickets were good numbers of Cardinal Beetles.

I'd always known of the Small Blue colonies at Caburn Bottom but never really found them in good numbers, this afternoons search begins. Walked out of Malling across the hill tops to the valley North of the hill fort at Caburn, temperatures were now rising and wind was easing, getting warm at the bottoms of these valleys. I noted a wandering Small Blue as soon as I was over the style at Bible bottom but quickly lost track of it. As soon as I approached the nettle bed at Oxteddle/Bible it was clear to see a good Small Blue emergence was in progress. Counting around 20 here as quick check.

Spent an hour or so with this colony, just watching, as they would rise to meet any other flying object that came nearby. One Peacock incessantly went through them time and again, such joy to watch.

Once I'd had my fill here it was time to have a look at Caburn Bottom itself but not before I'd managed to see Small Blues in the open grass clearly congregating around something, quite cool really around 6-8 at any one time on one cow-pat. Odd that in a field with myriads of cow-pats they were all on this one, something in that manure must be tasty

Couldnt resist popping up to Cerne though to check in on the Marshies, I also wanted to check out the Lankham Bottom site but didnt quite make it. A day of two halves again.

24th May 2019 Giant Hill, Cerne Abbas

Love this site, I know most people head straight for the more easier walk at the bottom of the Giant but I prefer the wander round to the Eastern facing scarp, that is really much quieter, actually normally on my own.

The Marshy action was well away and for the first time on this side of the hill I saw Duke Of Burgundys engaging the Marsh Fritillaries, always a give away when they do that always knew there was a Duke colony on the Southern side but here not seen them before. Ficking through the 20 or so Marshy's here I quickly saw one that was so much more Orangey than the norm...taking a closer look definately an aberation but what type is beyond me, anyone help? Be grately appreciated.
