Many thanks folks. Further research today suggests that finding Brimstones mating is quite rare, as they usually choose to copulate on the underside of a leaf. Indeed this was the case today.

I thought a couple more images of the pair might be in order. I might add that after photographing them I carefully replaced the surrounding foliage in a similar fashion to how I found it.

On the Butterfly front I can only describe the last week, or so, as dire.

It was Thursday last week before I spotted any Butterflies in Wiltshire at all,

then a male Brimstone and a male Orange Tip were seen flying at Lacock, and that was it until today. After a very slow start this morning, the Sun slowly began to win over the cool breeze, and several male Specklies came out to play. I then caught sight of a very fresh male Large White. This specimen really made me work for a photo, by long periods of flight between brief landings on Dandelions, then taking off just I pressed the shutter. Finally I nailed the b****r.

Next my first male Holly Blue of the season landed in an awkward spot, for one shot only.

I had a lunch appointment with Doug, so I had to reluctantly leave the old railway. After a fabulous meal, we headed off to Waldron, where Doug remembered a large patch of Cuckoo flower by the side of a lane. Sure enough there was a mass of flowering Cuckoo plant, where a Comma and an OT could be seen in the distance. The OT was quite obliging for the camera, probably as a result of less than perfect OT flying conditions.



Early this morning I popped over to Abbots Wood to see how the Pearl Bordered Fritillaries were faring. I needn't have arrived so early, as it was nearly 8am before the first one was seen. This was mainly down to the fairly strong, cool, breeze, but by 8 o'clock the Sun's warmth could be felt. My main aim was to try and locate a female PBF, as for me it's been all males so far this season. The butterflies seen today varied greatly in condition, from fairly fresh to near death. Indeed one poor old fellow lost part of it's left hind wing as I photographed it!. (see images).

As is usual the female PBF I was after, turned up in the main ride as I was heading home. It was also good to see at least four PBF flying along this ride as the best Bugle and Violets grow along there.

From my observations the numbers of PBF at Abbots Wood seem to be down this year, Tired gene pool?.



An early morning visit to this vast grassland site revealed 100's of Marbled Whites, outnumbering all other species. My attention was soon drawn to some large Fritillaries, flying very fast, and later searching the flora very slowly and thoroughly for females. What I was after was positive identification of the species, of the sort that Dave Cook saught when he discovered the Black Hairstreak far from known colonies. This confirmation came when two males dived into the grass, and as I approached

I could see a third butterfly that had caught their attention, drying it's wings down low. They were Dark Green Fritillaries. I was hoping for something more exotic, after all this vast site is rarely visited, and is left to manage itself and it is this sort of habitat where discoveries are made.

I felt it was time to call it a day just after lunchtime, and headed for the car. As I approached the Oaken wood junction, my footsteps sent up a nearby grounded PE., so I dropped my baggage and waited hoping for it's return. I also found two pairs of mating Ringlets. These were constantly pestered by other males trying to get in on the act. Many fresh Silver Washed Fritillaries, both male and female were seen, but nearly all were too active to be photographed.

The last photograph of today was of a fresh female Brimstone.

Then while watching BBC Breakfast, a reporter was standing on the seafront at Brighton talking about the Labour party conference, behind him, out to sea, was an ominous looking black cloud!. Consulting the Weather Radar on my laptop this confirmed a small but heavy shower was in progress over Brighton. About 20 mins later it started to chuck it down at home.

So I set out for Whitehawk hill in pouring rain, safe in the knowledge that the rain shower was temporary. On arrival several areas of the hill was searched, and soon several high speed LTB flybys were seen. 

The 2019 Emperor season was slower going than last year, and started about a week later. When male groundings started, the more enthusiast numbers grew,

and a grounded Emperor soon drew a small crowd, this is understandable but not ideal for photography, as only one person will have the best position for a square on shot. Humour and good manners are always at their best with the Chiddingfold regulars, and everyone gets a turn.

On one visit this year, just after lunch, I decided to head for home and having said farewell to the others, started walking back to the car, when suddenly, in an area of deep shade, an Emperor flew up in front of me, and could be seen flying close to the ground and off into the distance and touching down, very briefly, a couple of times.

I waited hoping for a return visit and after a short while he reappeared, still flying low and frequently landing for only a second or two. With nothing to lose I gave chase and snatched an image when possible. Finally he flew right down the track almost out of sight and landed in a distant sunny spot, and was still there when I caught up. Here in front me was, by far, the best specimen of the week, and I had him all to myself!.


