



Unlike yesterday a huge number of 'Whites' were present today along the old railway. All were very fresh indeed suggesting there been a mass emergence since Saturday. Whether they were Large, Small or Green Veined, obtaining images was not difficult.

Female Orange Tips outnumbered males today, and each one sent aspiring suitors packing in no uncertain terms. One female spent some time inspecting one of the few clumps of Garlic Mustard growing along the line, but no eggs were deposited. One male OT had a deformed right hand forewing affecting his flight, but that didn't stop him from trying his luck, but again she raised her abdomen, and he flew off.

A very rewarding hour!, Stay well everyone!.

After several shots my eye was distracted in another direction by a low, fast flying Butterfly which was almost certainly a Pearl Bordered Fritillary.

Half an hour passed before I had a definite PBF sighting, and this one was soaking up the sun near the path. I crept up as close as I dare, taking care not to cast a shadow, and managed several shots.

By now the strong sunshine prompted more PBF to become active, and several chases were taking place, but luckily for me some landed to bask and a few more shots were bagged. I would estimate that a good dozen Pearls were seen today.

Only four days ago in similar weather, but with no wind, none were seen at all.



The SPBF reintroduction at the BC reserves was achieved with a 'single shot' of 69 final instar larvae and 85 adults in spring 2017; there have been no subsequent releases of either larvae or adults.

The species double-brooded that first year, and every season since, so those currently flying are the sixth generation since the release occurred.

I was joined by three others today (including Gary Norman of the captive-breeding team) to conduct a systematic survey of both reserves. There are currently a minimum of 9 SPBF flying in Rowland Wood and 21 on Park Corner Heath. It is still very early in the flight season and Rowland Wood (which starts later than PCH) should be in full flow by later this week.

The first SPBF emerged here on 6 May, much earlier than usual. A second brood (partial, but strong) should emerge mid/third week July.

The weather was warm, but there were only brief glimpses of sunshine, and the butterflies responded while the sun shone. I thought my luck was in when a ginger/brown butterfly landed on a distant inaccessible fence. I set my camera on full zoom and managed two shots, the result a Comma.

Church Ope Cove is accessed via a flight of steep steps, which lead off a dead end lane. Looking up at the cliff from the boulder strewn beach it becomes clear why Large Torts are breeding there. The cliffs are covered in Elm trees, some mature. Importantly the was little sign of Dutch Elm disease die back on this years growth, though some branches were already dead from previous attacks. From what I've seen of Elms recently these looked generally healthy.

Later this morning I arrived at Steyning rifle range hoping to find an early Brown Hairstreak. As I reached the end of the track from Mouse lane there were four vehicles from the South Downs National Park Authority present, with four people working on some posts. A bit extravagant I thought, then I entered the BH site proper through the metal gate.

My heart sank!, for every clump of Blackthorn/Bullace along the edge of the meadow had been cleared, all the way to the fenced off BH reserve, and beyond. There is now hardly any Bullace left in the meadow at all, save for a small area by the

In the past I have had more success with BH in the meadow area, than in the reserve itself.

As the morning wore on one of the rangers pulled up in a Landrover, and asked if any BH had been seen. I took the opportunity to enquire about the drastic Blackthorn clearance.

Apparently the area of the meadow immediately outside of the fenced reserve was due to be cut as part of the Winter cutting rotation work.

But a misunderstanding lead to the wholesale clearance of the whole area I have described.

To add to this sorry tale, there is a small herd of Dexter cattle on the site as well!.

How well the Brown Hairstreak population does this year, in that area, remains to be seen.

Other species seen were Brown Argus, Common and Holly Blues, all three Whites, Commas, Small Tort., and later, at the classic start time, the species we had come to see!.

The weather at home on Friday, with clear blue sky and very hot sunshine, very nearly persuaded me to contact Wurzel in order to postpone yesterday's trip to Shipton Bellinger. Fortunately the weather on Saturday, at least in the morning, was perfect, with high cloud allowing just enough sun to filter through and keep us comfortable, and the butterflies active.

Wurzel had high hopes that the conditions might provoke the Brown Hairstreaks to appear early. Not a bit of it!, as he showed me the 'hot spots' nothing appeared, as we toured the famous hedge and beyond. For a moment I'm sure we were both thinking that the wrong day had been chosen.

Then bang on 11.00 Wurzel spotted a male BH nectaring on a thistle, and kindly offered me first pickings. This male often had to share his thistle with a female Meadow Brown, which sent him up several times, but this male was persistent and kept returning to the same flower head. The general area of this first find was to produce a further four males in fairly quick succession, to the delight of us and several other visitors.

Up to now no females had been seen, but this was to change when we toured the famous hedge. Wurzel was responsible for spotting at least three female BH along the length of the hedge. Even when we decided to call it a day we found a fresh female posing perfectly, not far from our cars. But this one was very flighty and eventually escaped without a single image for either of us.

An observation of the day was that males were always found on thistles, and the females preferred ripe blackberries. The day also provided a personal first. The only time I have photographed male and female BH on the same day!!.

I stood for ages watching and hoping that this butterfly would come down lower, but it was clearly not going to co-operate so I reluctantly disturbed the foliage, with nothing to lose, gently shook the general area the butterfly was occupying. It worked!, and I could now clearly see a pristine female BH.

Having spent the best part of an hour with that BH, it was time to carry on searching.

Back at the 'Bulford' end of the hedge an elderly couple were searching for BH. After a short conversation with them I started to resume my search, then I heard the woman shout out

"I've just disturbed one", I was, after a short while, able to relocate this perfectly fresh female BH.

And after many underside shots, this perfect female began to open up, and eventually opened up fully.



I also found a bonus Comma, and a most gorgeous, fresh, vibrant Red Admiral.



The 3rd brood Wall Browns were still going strong ( more later ), but in the meantime there were fresh Speckled Woods, Red Admirals, and a solitary Peacock ( too high for a shot ) to be seen.

Pleased to hear that, Trevor. One presumes that if average temperatures continue to rise, then this species will break out of its 'developmental trap' and start to become commoner in those places where conditions are optimal.

I don't think I'll be around to see any such success however; I think it will take another 30-50 years for any such success to result in the Wall Brown reoccupying many of the transect squares from which it has routinely disappeared from the mid-80s onwards.

In the meantime, I expect it will remain a largely coastal butterfly in the southernmost 10% of the country and continue its drive into more northerly climes.

This morning I had my first coffee of the day under one of the most spectacular sunrises I have ever seen, and this inspired me to pop over to Southwick to look for a November Holly Blue or two. After searching for a while I found a very fresh female Holly Blue in 'lockdown', perched on an apple leaf and having to endure a chilly easterly breeze.

After several shots I decided to thoroughly search the rest of the site, but no more were found, only a couple of Silver Y moths were seen. Upon return to the Holly Blue, about 45 mins later, she was beginning to warm up, and took a couple of feeble flights and finally opened up to bask, in the warmer conditions she was soon off and disappeared over towards the main road.

Without doubt this was my finest ever November butterfly!.

Nothing at all was seen. Returning, as I reached roughly the half way point between the fuel tanks and the steps I saw a distant ' white triangle ' perched on a leaf. Not convinced it was a butterfly I took a shot on full zoom, then enlarged the image on playback, sure enough a Holly Blue!.

Now the problem of getting closer. The butterfly was someway up the bank in a bramble thicket, not easy!. After some bad language and plentiful thorns I managed to get just close enough for a few sensible shots. Although she never opened up to bask, I was able to identify the sex when the breeze briefly blew her wings open. Amazingly, given the date this was another fresh example.

Nothing else was found, and I left with the thought that the fat Lady is about to sing.
